

Enable Course Discussions and Forum

Course Discussions are a way to engage students in your courses as well as receive any questions or comments from your students about your course or certain topic.

Course Discussions can be started by teachers or by students. They can be enabled for each course separately.

To enable your students to start course discussions, make sure to check the option "Allow students to initiate discussions" on the course summary page in your Course Manager.

If this option is on, non registered users will be able to see a list of the course topics. No access to course content is provided.

☒ Allow students to initiate discussions on course topics

This option only applies to students being able to initiate discussions. Teachers can start course discussions at any time.

If discussions are enabled students will be able to start discussions under each course topic.

How Teachers Start Discussions

To start a discussion open your **Course Manager**, find your course and click the red options button next to it. Then click **Manage Course Content** to open the course content builder.

On the content builder page click the Start Discussion button for one of your course topics.



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Students can start discussions in a similar way (if allowed) from the course content pages. Open course discussions show under each course topic.

Discussions as seen in the Course Manager (by teachers)

Differences between English and Latin verbs

1. Look at the verb *to give*. In English, the ending of the verb changes once: it acquires an *s* in *he gives*. In Latin, the ending of the verb changes every time. **The ending of the verb is crucial** as it tells you the
